

During the first World War, a young man - a barber in peacetime - enlisted in the Iowa National Guard. Soon he found himself part of the 168th Infantry of the 42nd Division, the Rainbow Division. By virtue of its makeup, with soldiers from all sections of the country, this division was dubbed the Rainbow Division.

In July of 1918, the 42nd was committed to battle against the Germans to reduce the Marne Salient. In spite of withering machine gun fire and heavy artillery bombardment, the 168th Infantry took their objective.

As the battle drew to an end, a messenger was needed to deliver an important word to one of the platoons. Private Martin A. Treptow, barber turned warrior, grabbed the message and moved out under fire. As he reached the platoon leader, Treptow was shot down by a hail of bullets. Later, in policing up Treptow's personnel effects, a diary was found in the blood-stained shirt of this doughboy. Written in Treptow's own hands were the words entitled,



My Pledge,

"America shall win the war.

Therefore,

- I will work.
- I will save.
- I will sacrifice.
- I will endure.
- I will fight cheerfully
- and do my utmost,
- As if the whole issue of the struggle depended on me alone."

These words serve as a memorial to the price he paid.

Martha was 8-years-old. Her stepmom gave birth to Martha's half-siblings—seven boys and the eighth, a girl. After Martha graduated high school, the family moved to California next to a family of Adventists. It was through these neighbors that Martha and her family were introduced to the Adventist faith and were baptized. This impacted the trajectory of Martha's life as it was through the pastor that she was encouraged to attend Pacific Union College (PUC) where she studied Nursing. Martha practiced as a nurse from age 25 until age 68. Among her passions, Martha is a voracious reader and always has books in written and audio form that she pours through each day. She is an avid crafter, creating rubber stamped personalized greeting cards, scrapbooks and other projects. She also has a very green thumb and makes use of her smaller garden space to tend to a variety of flourishing florals. Over the years, Martha admits that her faith has been challenged. Her first marriage was to a non-believer, providing a conflict that eventually proved to be too much and ended in divorce, however, true to His Word, the Lord caused all things to work together for good as the divorce brought Martha back to the church. It was quite some time before she married again, this time choosing a husband with whom she had more in common. Together, they enjoyed lots of outdoor activities. They hiked, backpacked and mountain climbed the many 1,400+ ft. Colorado peaks, even though her husband was fifteen years older. Although active, Martha's husband discovered that he had a heart condition and required open-heart surgery. After the surgery, he never fully recovered. After his death, church family and coworkers reached out to Martha and embraced her as she struggled to process through the loss. This support was invaluable to Martha and enabled her to experience the faithfulness of the Lord, even through the dark moments. To this day, Martha looks forward to her time with the Lord daily and keeps a journal to help remind her of the progression of her Christian journey. Martha loves her church and considers her church as a second family, especially since most of her relatives are far away.
